



Dawn just turned 38, is significantly cognitively challenged, and is a music enthusiast extraordinaire. She plays her music CDs at home and sings along quite frequently. I contacted Elf Ron Breuer (one of my school mates), and told him our seats were in the Loge just in case there could be interaction or a shout out for Dawn. On the bus to an event, I also asked Program Director, Donna Edington. I knew that we were in good hands.

Concert night and Dawnie has her Santa hat on with 'Dawn' written on it, and was so ready to go to the concert. We arrived early, chatted with the usher upstairs and a lovely, generous woman asked us if we would like to upgrade our tickets and accept complimentary center orchestra seats. She must have thought me to be extremely ungrateful because I was hemming and hawing about accepting them,

Such kindness and attention almost cannot be described. Santa said hi, some singers said hi. I nearly cry each time I think of it. You all brought so much happiness to Dawn and Charlie and me. Apparently, the family seated in back of Dawn shared the experience because they stopped us after the concert with smiles and observations that would warm your heart.

Her enthusiasm started the next day off and her Dad wrote a letter of explanation about her behavior to her job site (she works at the Long Branch sheltered workshop every day). 

Season #17 was suddenly upon us as we delivered event #628 at Woodbine Developmental and #629 at Ancora. And what appropriate places they were to start out, both a stark reminder of why we do this.

### Woodbine Developmental Center

On Monday, a gloomy day, we saw the men of Woodbine. Because of the early 10 am bus, we had a small band of volunteers, some of them first-time Holiday Express 'newbies.' On the long ride to Woodbine, located somewhere deep in the Pine Barrens, there really was no way to explain to them what they were about to experience.

It's always amazing to me to see familiar faces at these events but there they were. Even though it was men only, dancing was the rule of the day and the audience was quick to get into the spirit of the party as the band opened with Val leading the way on "We Need A Little Christmas." It was a small band with Jerry 'The Legend' acting as the entire horn section, but it actually sounded pretty good (every once in awhile) and we all agreed it was surprising how fast the time went. And, you know what? There is still something special about belting out "All Alone At Christmas" for the first time. It still gets you.

## Ancora Psychiatric Hospital

There is no public facility in NJ, except perhaps the Statehouse, that has been more pilloried in the media over the past year than Ancora. I am sure the abuses and other problems that were uncovered were real, but what we encountered bore no resemblance to any of that. We had a slightly larger band, albeit without a horn section, but a few new band members were in attendance for their Holiday Express debut.

It was a slow start as most of the 300 or so residents were busy eating their tasty Jersey Mike's subs (please shop there), but once they got going, the party took off like a rocket. I think the main reason was the staff who, we were told, volunteered to be there. They got involved with everything we did right from the get-go and it rubbed off on the clients. Probably one of the best versions ever of "Candles Burning Low" with a dozen or so of the staff belting out the last verse. "12 Days" was hysterical, particularly with Louis, the wandering 'French Hen,' but the best was yet to come. BethAnne's son, Paul, debuted his soon to be hit single, "I Love Santa Claus," while sitting on the piano as his Mom backed him up. Wait 'til you hear this...and Paul wrote it! And he's not even 7 yet!!!

Notes From the Road, written by Tim McLoone, can easily evoke the feelings of having been there in person. We hope you enjoy reading about how Holiday Express fulfills our mission – no matter what – from Tim's personal and candid observations.

That was followed by Mary D'Arcy's always impressive rendition of "Oh Holy Night" that moved one resident to tenderly kiss Mary's hand as she sang. Talk about your Holiday Express 'moments!' The raffles were really appreciated at both events and soon it was time to go from Ancora, but we just couldn't stop, adding "Love Train," which got almost the whole room on the floor – even those confined to chairs. Then it was "All Alone At Christmas" and it was

done. A wonderful start to the season. Two down and only 48 to go!

## Trenton Area Soup Kitchen; Trenton Psychiatric Hospital

Today was our annual Trenton Trip with stops at Trenton Area Soup Kitchen and then Trenton Psychiatric Hospital. We were reflecting on the fact that we have taken this trip in a wild snowstorm, windy rains and hail, but yesterday was kind of mild and nice out. It's nonetheless always a jolt when we drive up to the Soup Kitchen and see several of their clients sleeping on the cold ground outside.

By all accounts, yesterday was our 14th year at TASK. In some ways it has changed: new directors and, of course, we lost our good friend Tyrone a few years back. But in most ways it is the same. Desperately impoverished people, aged well beyond their years, and most of them with a certain 'street' look, whether from being out in the elements, or the more visible scars on their faces.

We never got a final count but it looked like between 400-500 came through and had a meal while we played away. The original estimate was thought to be closer to 800 since we had served 700+ the year before but, we were told, the turnout was lighter yesterday because they were wherever they live waiting for government checks.

The clients there are always surprisingly receptive to us and the highlight had to be Desiree singing "White Christmas" with the band and then some other songs later. A great voice. And then there was young Michael, as pleasant as you could want, 23 years old and there with his Mom. When I asked what plans he had, he seemed, at first, perplexed that someone would ask him that and then embarrassed that he really didn't have an answer. Heartbreaking. And so it goes at the Trenton Soup Kitchen.

Trenton Psychiatric was crazy and fun as always. The staff there really makes an effort with their patients. I could not believe how many staff members were dancing with, or hugging their clients, many of whom are obviously difficult to handle. We never cease to be amazed that these social workers come back there everyday to do their life's calling. It is truly humbling.

We saw a lot of the same faces we have seen there for many years now. The big aspiration for most of them is to be released into a group home of some sort but, in many cases, the waiting lists are long. In so many of the cases, however, you can readily see how they would have difficulty surviving in an unsupervised environment.

We were getting a lot of group participation, singing and dancing for awhile but then, after about an hour or so, all the energy just drained out of the room. We don't know if it was related to medications or what, but quickly everyone started drifting away. It happens like this every year.

But we'll be back.

Well, just when I thought we had experienced everything possible at a Holiday Express event, two really compelling ones took place. They were our 18th and 19th of this year and 645th and 646th overall (are you listening Toys"R"Us?) so you would think there would have developed a certain predictability by now.

## The Lyons House – Center of Recovery and Hope Department of veterans Affairs

Now, we had been here at the urging of Maureen Staub (ok, she TOLD us we were going) a couple of times a few years back but we were early in the 'season' back then and the vets in attendance were only geriatrics and they didn't like us very much... ok, they hated us. So, this location was dropped from the schedule. It was, obviously, put back on this year and we played to a pretty large audience that really covered all demographics with a number of children, a disabled group, and, of course, many vets from all of this country's unfortunate wars of the past 60+ years.

The party was a little slow to develop but some dancing broke out early anyway and that seemed to break the ice. A brief ceremony was then held with a lot of 'thank yous' being given but it was a prayer offered by one of the older vets that really touched everyone:

"Holy Father in heaven, we come to you today to praise you and to glorify you. But most of all, we want to thank you for making the Veteran's Program what it is today. We ask that you bless this celebration and everyone here – veterans, non-veterans, and especially the volunteers from Holiday Express. We ask that you bless their families and keep them safe. We ask that you guide us and lead us as we travel down the road to recovery. Make our quest for recovery an easy one. Be there when we get weak and when our minds are troubled. Be there when we lose confidence in ourselves. Give us the strength that we need to survive and prosper. Give us your love and peace in our hearts."

I've made a pretty big point over the years of telling people Holiday Express is not a religious organization, but we certainly are a spiritual one and that simply eloquent prayer moved everyone.

After that we dove in with "God Bless America" and there was no turning back. We discovered a vet singer, John Cantey, through "Candles Burning Low" and he regaled us (yes, he did) with a very Nat King Cole-esque version of "Chestnuts Roasting...aka "The Christmas Song" that was so very touching. The 'Disco Santas' were a howl and we had a rousing version of the "Twelve Days" as well, with a previously reluctant crowd participating to a man and woman. There was even a Bandiera look-alike sighting! (further proof that war is,

indeed, hell). Melissa finished it off with what has become a very moving version of "True Colors" and it was time to go home.

The vets and their staff seemed genuinely touched by the whole experience with many of them taking the time to speak with all of us. A great day. Thanks, Maureen (and Amy R). It just took us a few years to figure it out.

## A. Harry Moore

Monday morning shows are not necessarily where everyone wants to be, but we never have a problem filling a bus to go here. This is a school in Jersey City for severely disabled children who, in many cases, are also from impoverished families. The staff is warm and loving but the problems they and these children face everyday are more than apparent. Almost everyone is in a chair of some sort and many can neither speak nor hear. The mortality of their students is also a tragic reality the teachers and staff of this school have to face. I don't know the exact age of the students but they appear to be from 4 or 5 up to 18 or 19 when they must graduate. I may be wrong about those ages.

The building is an old brick structure that conjures up images of *Ralphie* from "A Christmas Story." We play in a smallish auditorium that has no fixed chairs for obvious reasons. The walls are covered with hand lettered signs welcoming us that we bring back to display in the Holiday Express warehouse.

The 'program' began with an introduction by one of the students that he wrote. He could barely get any sound out at all but the audience roared upon the conclusion of his intro. Val walked into the crowd to start with "Happy Holidays" but when it transitioned to "Nobody Ought To Be..." the room exploded with noise and excitement. The Kathryn Barnett Holiday Express dancers, elves and characters all entered and it was sheer, beautiful chaos. After that, there were so very many touching moments...the deaf boy who put his head, face first, into the bell of Rick's sax while Rick played; the outrageous woman with the 'Nine Ladies Dancing," "True Colors" (again) and all the rest. The 90 minutes flew by and it was a shame to leave. But they had saved the best for last. The 'thank you' was given to us by another student who couldn't herself speak but typed her message into a device that can then produce the words as she 'said' thank you to us. It was just too much.

Like I said, 646 events and counting, and this may have been the best of them all. We were blessed to be there.

### Matheny Medical and Education Center

This is another one of the events that Maureen Staub 'told us to do' but, as always with Maureen, she was right on the money with this one. Of course, we have gone to Matheny for over a decade now and it never ceases to amaze. During that time, however, we lost the dear, departed Robin who meant so much to all of us – but onward we march.

Well, this Sunday was a little different as 'black ice' covered the roadways of 287, 206 and 202, making access to Matheny treacherous to say the least. I had opted to drive there with bassist Mark Murphy who took the position that, if the roads are dangerous, then let's drive faster so we spend less time on the roads! A little scary, but we did get there.

Unfortunately, the bus was not as lucky so we launched the show minus the costumes and bus-bound musicians and helpers, but with a strong North Jersey contingent of *male* singers. As we started, we never realized how much we depended on costumed characters and women to lead "Candles Burning Low" but we fought on.

I finally introduced "Higher and Higher" since we had three horns to provide some musical firepower and, just as we were wailing away, Ron and then Donna appeared on the stage. The bus had at last arrived! I extended "Higher and Higher" in anticipation of a zillion female singers swarming the stage leading to a boisterous finale. As Joe Petillo entered (another male singer!) as the only singer on the bus, I knew that doom was descending on us – quickly! Ah, nothing like hearing a bunch of guys singing in 'girl keys' to lift your heart at the holiday season. I'm pretty sure the audience didn't care but it was all a little scary – musically anyway.

It's a great group at Matheny and a wonderful place to be. It's always good to be with Ara, Camille, Missy and the rest of the gang – but we will always miss Robin.

### Eva's Village (See story on Page 17)

This was event #35 of the season (and #662 overall) and when do we stop saying, "this was the best one ever?" We made a significant change this year after Sister Gloria told us that all of the adults were unable to fit into the dinner because of the increased number of children in the room. So, in typical Holiday Express fashion, we held an earlier 'Children and Moms' party at 4:30 and that was a lot of fun.

The adults arrived at 6:00 and were treated to a terrific meal by the McLoone's Pier House staff which definitely put everyone in a good mood. There is really no explaining what transpired after that: all-out participation by the 300+ in the room, so many of whom are in active addiction recovery. Eva's is a remarkable place, truly a 'village.' They have about 40 resident men trying to overcome their addictions and an equal number of women with children, plus the adjacent residential housing they are developing to provide transitional homes for their clients. They provide a broad array of social services to help these good people successfully work their way into society.

For many years now, trumpeter Tony Perruso and his co-workers from Wells Fargo Advisors have championed Eva's as the Giving Partner. This past season, Lori George, whose husband also works for Wells Fargo, got her own employer involved! Tracy Early, partner in Untracht Early, not only gave employees the go-ahead to be an additional Giving Partner for Eva's, but also made a matching donation to Holiday Express!

You really have to root for a group like Eva's. Nothing is coming easily for them right now (ever?), but it didn't stop anyone from yelling out 'Six Geese A Laying!' We could be with them everyday.

## The Children's Center of Monmouth County

This was one of the physically most demanding of all we've ever done but, given the disabilities displayed right in front of us, it's a little difficult to complain about being tired. We started at the Children's Center a few years back at the suggestion of Board member, Paul Huegel, whose son, Cal, is a student there, and we did a couple of 45 minute mini-shows as different classes were brought in. Last year we found out that we were still not seeing all of the students so we offered to do as many of those 'mini-shows' as necessary to see everyone. Well, that turned out to be five opportunities to visit "Candles Burning Low..."

Each group had 90+ students plus very large number of healthcare professionals, social workers, etc., many of whom were one-on-one with the students, the vast majority of whom had severe autism. Once we got them revved up, the party began to look like a track meet with care givers chasing students around the room and dancing breaking out everywhere.

The last group of older children (teens) included a terrific young man named Irahon who was clearly a leader among his peers and went to great trouble to make sure his 'posse' all got to sing into the mic. Then he graced us with a song by himself. His voice was strong and pure, belying his disabilities, as the crowd roared. Suddenly, we weren't so tired after all.

### St. John's Soup Kitchen Trinity Church Soup Kitchen

Season #17 came to an end in two locations: St. John's Soup Kitchen in Newark and Trinity Church Soup Kitchen in Asbury Park. It always saddens us that we have to split the group to service both locations since I think we would all like to be together on the last day.

Last year saw drenching Christmas Eve rains, so much better weather was a welcome respite this time around, as we served just under 700 in Newark. The Rum Runner kitchen staff started their day very early to prepare all of the food for folks who view this as their Christmas dinner. And it's always amazing to see the organization that goes into fitting out the tent and keeping the food line replenished, helping our guests get seated and served, and then busing the tables. Others were working to clean, organize and restock the pantry while another group worked the gift bag line. It was all so impressive.

And to think that the same thing was happening down in Asbury at the same time, with another 400 folks served. McLoone's in Asbury provided the food there, while Jim Celestino led the (very large) band. It's amazing that we almost take this additional Christmas Eve event for granted now.

It's over now which always feels strange. There is the relief that you don't have to be somewhere tomorrow morning (and then again in the afternoon), but there is also a strange emptiness as well. As I write this, I am listening to a forecast predicting that temperatures will only be in the 20s tomorrow with wind chills well below zero. It has to make you wonder how the many people we have just visited will be able to survive. And, as we find out each year, some of them won't.





## Why I Am a Holiday Express Volunteer By Barbara Willis

hat drives people to help strangers who need a hand? And what determines which charitable organizations we support? For me, choosing Holiday Express was easy. When I look into the eyes of the clients, I see myself.

I grew up in a federal housing project, in a household where even the bare necessities were hard to come by. We had no car, no savings account, no frills. Like most little girls, I yearned to go to dancing school. My dad took a second job to make my dream possible, but soon lost both jobs following a series of hospitalizations for his heart. The dancing school teacher, knowing our situation, kept me on for free.

When my dad's condition worsened and there were no more medical options, the doctors felt it was best if he rested at home. It wasn't long after that when, at the age of five, I returned one day from dancing school and found him dead on the bathroom floor. My recital was two weeks away. Despite friends telling my mom it would be disrespectful to have me participate so soon after my dad's passing, she forged ahead. She told me to dance for my father, since he would be watching me perform from heaven.

It was my mother's relentless spirit that got us through the tough times. Just months before my dad's passing, my 12-year-old sister also died unexpectedly. I don't honestly know how my mother coped with the trauma of losing her daughter and her husband...and having no resources and a young child to raise. The only thing my mom inherited following my dad's death was a pile of medical bills.



Over the years, my mom always had a way of making more out of less. She was incredibly resourceful, earning money as the unofficial seamstress for the dancing school and providing typing services to local businesses. She saved every penny to buy me a Barbie doll and clothed her in an amazing wardrobe of sequined gowns which she designed. To this day, I value those lovingly executed creations more than any of my other possessions.

When the time came for me to apply to college, I wasn't sure I wanted to go. My mother's tearful eyes said it all. She lived for me to "make good" and escape the life of poverty. As luck would have it, I got a full scholarship to Rutgers. So I made a deal with my mom to try it for one year. If I didn't like it, she reluctantly agreed that she would not stand in the way of my exploring other pursuits. Her endless encouragement and support through my freshman year convinced me to stick with it and, ultimately, to continue my schooling for a Master's degree.

Today I am a communications professional with a resume that includes responsible positions at Fortune 500 companies and public relations agencies. However, deep

inside, I am still that little girl from the federal housing project who knows how it feels to be among the less fortunate.

For this reason, I am a Holiday Express volunteer. Though much of my contribution has involved using my skills to create content for the Web site and write articles for the newsletters and yearbook, I treasure most the interaction with the clients.

My first experience was in 2003 at Medallion Care, a behavioral health facility for adults. I arrived by car before the bus. When I walked into the center wearing my Holiday Express shirt, several clients got so excited that they nearly smothered me with hugs. I remember visiting the Lyons Veterans Affairs facility and having one of the men ask if I knew how to jitterbug. After we finished dancing, he thanked me profusely and confessed that he hadn't "cut a rug" in years.

Another fond memory is from a past Make-A-Wish event, where I volunteered to be a face painter. There was nothing I could paint on the sweet faces of those children to take away the hardship of their daily lives. However, for that moment in time, they felt special and their faces glowed with happiness.

The sad reality is that untold numbers of people in difficult circumstances do not have the supportive and affectionate role model that I had growing up. Holiday Express helps fill that void by letting young and old in schools, nursing homes, specialty care facilities and soup kitchens know that they matter. And here's the pay back we never requested: their smiles tell us that we matter to them, too.



I suppose we all have a unique story about how we first came to know about Holiday Express. My first meeting

This is something I have been quite passionate about as it targets the youth in need and gives them the fighting chance they may have been denied. It teaches them that someone can actually care about their well being without asking for anything in return.

# Eva's Village Tells U.N. About its Mission

In preparation for a United Nations meeting in February, 2010, 190 nongovernmental organizations from 62 countries submitted reports describing how they help their clients.

Just three groups were invited to present their stories – and the only American organization included was Eva's Village

"We're successful because we have a board that's actively involved, because we are very strict about sticking to our mission and because we have an amazing staff," Sister Gloria Perez, Eva's Executive Director, told the session.

Created in 1982 to provide meals to about 30 homeless people in the basement of an old convent, Eva's Village has since grown to a multitiered human-services agency with an annual \$8 million operating budget.

It feeds about 1,000 people daily, runs a series of homeless shelters, provides addiction rehab programs, operates transitional housing for clients making their way out of homelessness and runs a free health clinic. It's also building affordable-housing units that will serve both the disabled and the working poor.

"Once we started the food kitchen, we thought, what good is feeding people if they're living in the streets? So we opened shelters," she explained. "Then we realized many of the men and women we served were addicted, so we opened a treatment program. Then we realized their health was in a terrible state, so we opened one of only five free clinics in New Jersey."

The panel was held as part of the annual meeting of the U.N.'s Commission for Social Development. The session was designed to demonstrate ways that non-governmental organizations can help bring basic human rights to all people.

Our next experience was the Lakeview School in Edison. Virtually all of the children have neurological disorders and are in wheelchairs. A little touch on the arm or a smile in their face evokes a response. Here, Nancy bonded with one of the young wheelchair bound girls. I even got to be Cookie Monster!

Our final event that year was on Christmas Eve at the Trinity Church Soup Kitchen in Asbury Park. We couldn't stop talking about Christmas Eve and how this was one of the best Christmases ever. In 2009, Nancy and I did the same Lakeview School event and Nancy reconnected with her "friend" from the first year. I really wanted to volunteer at the New Lisbon School event since Tim has said how tough a place it is. Well, Tim was right. New Lisbon epitomizes the need for Holiday Express.

We did another new event for us this year, the Alpha School in Jackson. Just as the show was about to start, a shy young girl approached Tim and said she wanted to sing "Silent Night." Well, the voice that came from this little girl was a "Susan Boyle" moment. I looked at everyone in the band and all our jaws had dropped. Definitely a Holiday Express moment!

We have so enjoyed the new friendships we have made by volunteering with Holiday Express and sharing the joy of "bringing the gift of human kindness."

Warehouse volunteers begin working in mid-October. Before the packing begins, the inventory coming in has to be counted and organized. Product donations come in all season long and have to be accounted for and hopefully are put somewhere in that large space where they can be easily found. We pre-pack the toiletry kits that just about everyone receives in their gift bags. At the end of the season there's the mountainous task of cleaning up, reorganizing and counting what's left. We

need as many volunteers in the warehouse after the season as we do preparing for it – please feel free to stop by any morning in January and February.

Several people have suggested that every Holiday Express volunteer should spend at least an hour or two working in the warehouse. It gives you great perspective as to the enormity of the task Holiday Express undertakes every year. The warehouse is where it all begins and where it all ends – give it a try, you may get hooked!



Holiday Express' efforts to meet and discuss the use of the name with Toys"R"Us were initially ignored and then declined by the Toys"R"Us legal department. Toys"R"Us did, however, affirmatively inform Holiday Express that Toys"R"Us would not stop using the "Holiday Express" name.

My interests include hiking, bike riding, basketball, coaching my son's sports teams and Scouting. I serve as an Assistant Scoutmaster for Boy Scout Troop 148 in Long Branch.

At Holiday Express events, I have performed a variety of duties – handling out gift bags, serving food, or donning any costume character I can fit into. I serve as Event Manager for several events during our Season. I enjoy managing events at new places. It is very challenging figuring out the logistics for a first time event as you meet with the director of the facility. However, the best part of being somewhere for the first time is that neither Holiday Express or the guests guite know what to expect. The reaction after each first time event is always the same . We can't wait until next year!

I am a CPA and work for Lawrence B Goodman & Co., PA, an accounting and consulting firm that specializes in Dental Practices. Because of my experience as a CPA, I was invited to join the Holiday Express Board of Trustees and serve as treasurer, a position I have held for the past four years. I obtain a great deal of satisfaction dealing with the inner working of the organization and see first-hand how wonderful and committed each Board/Committee member is to our cause

One of my most memorable Holidav Express experiences occurred the first time we traveled to

St. John's Soup Kitchen in Newark. It was Christmas Eve morning and it had snowed a little through the night. As we got off the bus we saw this was literally a soup KITCHEN. There was no room for the guests to eat inside. They took their food and either sat on the curb in the parking lot or stood at makeshift tables fastened to a fence, lightpole or street sign.

> The sound crew had already set up the equipment and microphones. with wires running all over the snow. We found out that our drummer could not make it. We all wondered if everyone was willing to stand around in a freezing parking lot and listen to the small troupe of volunteers we had that day.

As soon as the music started the tiny crowed started to build. The "elves" were encouraging the guests to dance and the band was working hard getting the group

involved by passing around the microphone. As I witnessed this, the first thought that came to mind was "I hope no one gets electrocuted from all these wires running over the snow."

My second thought was, 'Wow, I guess everyone knows the words to "Silent Night." And this thought was confirmed after the show as we were sitting on the bus waiting to pull away. The priest came on board with tears in his eyes and said, "You have given us such a wonderful Christmas present. I want to return the favor by telling you something remarkable that just happened." He continued, "There was a young man who has been visiting St. John's for several months now. He has never made eye contact nor said a word to anyone. We have tried to get information from him, so we can apply for benefits on his behalf, to no avail. That young man was the second person to sing when you passed around the microphone during "Silent Night." We did not think he could speak."

I think of that moment every Christmas Eve and every time I hear that song. That event has evolved a lot since then. We pledged never to have those guests sit on a snowy curb while we are there. Every Christmas Eve since that first show, the guests have been served a full sit-down meal, courtesy of the staff at McLoone's, under a large heated tent...with a band with a drummer.

This is just one story from countless events over the years that epitomizes what Holiday Express is all about.










